1. **Subject Name:** RARE CONSEQUENCES OF BLUNT ABDOMINAL TRAUMA.
2. **Type of subject:** Optional.
3. **Course Objectives:** To acquire synthesized knowledge of rare consequences of blunt abdominal trauma, as information on this topic is typically scattered across individual case reports rather than presented in comprehensive reviews.
4. **Form of study:** Doctoral School.
5. **Year of study:** -
6. **Form of classes and number of hours for each form of classes:** Optional classes (seminars) – either stationary or on-line (to be determined with doctoral students); 10 hours.

8. **Teaching methods:**
 - I. Integrated method: Presentation of learning material, questions and answers and discussion to provide context and summarise larger portions of learning material.
 - II. Case study method. Analysis of authentic cases of rare consequences of blunt abdominal trauma, i.e. post-traumatic ruptures and lacerations of structures that are considered anatomical variations or anomalies (Meckel's diverticulum, accessory spleen, splenosis), damage to normal organs but encountered sporadically (liver rupture manifesting as gastrointestinal bleeding) or conditions that, despite their traumatic aetiology, can hardly be regarded as typical injuries (splenic torsion following blunt abdominal trauma).
 - III. Comparative method – comparison of the analysed cases with other cases more commonly encountered in daily clinical practice.
9. **Learning outcomes**

Developing an awareness of the existence of rare sequelae of abdominal injuries. Gaining a general understanding of their circumstances, clinical course, diagnosis, and treatment methods.

Skills: Acquiring the ability to recognize uncommon and atypical outcomes of abdominal trauma. Extracting key data from the medical history, with particular emphasis on the circumstances of the injury as reported by the patient.
